Commissioner Donoghue:

We urge the New York City Parks Department to work expeditiously with Prospect Park Alliance and community stakeholders to develop a new policy for Prospect Park that allows e-bike users to access the park.

We acknowledge the safety concerns that Prospect Park faces regarding e-bikes that led to the ban. However, e-bikes are legal to ride on New York City streets and make moving around the city more accessible without adding more pollution and congestion to our streets and parks via cars or environmentally unfriendly forms of transportation.

Currently, e-bikes are not allowed in Prospect Park because the Parks Department <u>defines</u> <u>e-bikes</u> as motor vehicles, putting them in the same category as everything from 4,000 lb. trucks to 6,000 lb. SUVs that may prove deadly to pedestrians and cyclists alike in the event of a crash. Simply put, the Parks Department has no justification for classifying e-bikes in the same category as SUVs or trucks at all, and the Parks Department's current blanket ban on e-bikes in Prospect Park sends the wrong message about our city's values. Keeping safety, equity, accessibility, environmental health, and worker and immigrant justice at the forefront of conversations, we strongly believe that Parks can establish a policy that safely permits bike users to ride in the park.

E-bike users include delivery workers who keep us fed, families on cargo bikes, individuals recovering from surgery, older adults, people who live in areas with fewer public transit options, those who want to limit their carbon footprint by not driving cars, and so many more. In other words, *e-bike users are all New Yorkers*.

As a city, we should be encouraging ebike usage instead of creating zones of inaccessibility within the city.



As the council members whose districts incorporate Prospect Park, we are eager to work with your agency to establish a community engagement process and craft a policy that permits e-bikes in Prospect Park while also taking into consideration safety concerns. We look forward to your prompt reply.
